
We pray that, in social, economic and political situations of conflict, we may be courageous and passionate architects of dialogue and friendship.

Grace moves God's people to ask questions grounded in the call we received at Baptism: how do we better nourish, accompany, give witness, support, invite, welcome, engage and be present to others, such that we all grow in holiness?

(Prayerful and Eucharistic – Discernment Paper p. 6)

'I dream of a "missionary option", that is, a missionary impulse capable of transforming everything, so that the Church's customs, ways of doing things, times and schedules, language and structures can be suitably channelled for the evangelisation of today's world rather than for her self-preservation.'

A reading from the second book of the Kings (4:42-44)

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some over."' He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said.

Responsorial Psalm

R. The hand of the Lord feeds us; he answers all our needs.

All your creatures shall thank you, O Lord, and your friends shall repeat their blessing. They shall speak of the glory of your reign and declare your might, O God. **R.**

The eyes of all creatures look to you, and you give them their food in due time. You open wide your hand, grant the desires of all who live. **R.**

The Lord is just in all his ways and loving in all his deeds. He is close to all who call him, who call on him from their hearts. **R.**

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians (4:1-6)

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, through all and within all.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

A great prophet has appeared among us; God has visited his people. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (6:1-15)

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee - or of Tiberias - and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself.

Scripture Notes

The first reading and the Gospel both show God's concern for his people who are hungry. Food is a necessity for life and without it who can aspire to a higher form of life? Both feedings are miraculous, and there is an essential human element to each event, without which there would be no miracle. Few of us in Australia today have experienced constant hunger. The bread talked about is concerned with ordinary bread and ordinary hunger and is a miracle of generosity. Firstly, from the little boy who provided the five loaves and two fish, as they were all he had. Then Jesus' generosity in ensuring that everyone had their fill but there were still 12 baskets of leftovers. This miracle prepared the people to receive the bread of eternal life. We might say that we can't multiply the loaves that Jesus did. But we don't have to. God does the miracle through the seasons and the harvest. In our wheat fields God multiplies grains, not loaves. A single grain can produce as many as 70 grains so the food is there. All we have to do is share it, or the money to buy it. Saying grace before a meal is a good practice. In a world where many go hungry, it is something we shouldn't take for granted. Feeding the hungry is the first of the great works of mercy. Perhaps in our parish today, a kind word, a show of care for our neighbour, a call to see how a person is doing are the grains that are needed.
