VICTORIA This weekend is the CatholicCare Victoria Sunday Appeal. Your support and generosity will help provide caring support

for people when they are at their most broken. Below is an account of how some of our donations are being used.

CatholicCare Victoria Bushfire Recovery Program in Far East Gippsland

The Bushfire Recovery team in East Gippsland is made up of an experienced Family Counsellor, Aaron and a Community Development Officer, Madelaine who happens to have a passion creativity and colour. Aaron and Madelaine provide colour and creativity workshops and offer communities, connection over a coffee, and counselling to assist with many and varied needs. We travel right across the East Gippsland region, where the effects of the severe 2019-20 bushfires are still felt by many. The CatholicCare Victoria 4WD vehicle is set up with an espresso coffee machine, fridge and generator to allow us to reach communities, no matter how remote they are. The vehicle was fitted locally here in Bairnsdale and local businesses were active sponsors of the program from the outset.

Aaron and Madelaine connect with, and offer care to families, individuals and groups of all ages and situations, including children. The long-lasting stressors of the bushfires, compounded by the previous 10 years of drought and then COVID, means that the need for this service is greater than ever. Ours is a free service for participants and any residents of East Gippsland are eligible to benefit. The program is fully funded by CatholicCare Victoria thanks to generous philanthropic sponsorship, allowing us to provide a quality service using quality art materials, locally sourced.

The colour therapy program encourages people to reconnect with their joy, sometimes releasing pain, and importantly, reconnecting with each other in a loving and supportive group setting. We also see that the colour therapy sessions can lead people to reach out for both short term or longer-term counselling support, or sometimes referring others.

Liturgy of the Eucharist-Preface

Once the priest has set the bread and wine apart for the sacrifice and said the prayer over those gifts asking the power of God to come upon them, we begin what is the most sacred moment in the Liturgy of the Eucharist. The Eucharistic Prayer. Or, as we used to call it, the Canon. We say it is right to give thanks to God because everything comes from God as gift. And it is what we mean when we say just that it gets right relationship right. The whole point of sacrifice in the Bible was to acknowledge God as the giver of all gifts. We were simply returning to God what we had received from Him as a recognition that He owned everything, and we owned nothing. So, the same thing happens in the Mass. That's why we say it is right and just that we give God thanks and praise because He is the giver of all gifts, and all the gifts are gathered up in the bread and wine now set upon the altar. Then we have what's called the Preface, which is really the beginning the Eucharistic Prayer, and it recalls some of the things God has done. This again is deeply biblical because the Bible talks about a God who acts - in a sense the Bible is the story of what God does. Having told the story, we gather up our prayer. The Preface issues into the Prayer of the Angels when we say: "Holy, Holy, Holy", words taken from the Bible. They are the song of the Angels, so the Church, having acknowledged that it is right and just to give thanks and told the story of what God has done, joins the chorus of the Angels in singing of the infinite holiness of God whose glory fills all heaven and earth. The song of the Angels really opens the door to the Eucharistic Prayer that follows.

A reading from the book of Wisdom (18:6-9)

That night had been foretold to our ancestors, so that, once they saw what kind of oaths they had put their trust in, they would joyfully take courage. This was the expectation of your people, the saving of the virtuous and the ruin of their enemies; for by the same act with which you took vengeance on our foes you made us glorious by calling us to you.

The devout children of worthy men offered sacrifice in secret and this divine pact they struck with one accord: that the saints would share the same blessings and dangers alike; and forthwith they had begun to chant the hymns of the fathers.

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews (11:1-2, 8-12)

Only faith can guarantee the blessings that we hope for, or prove the existence of the realities that at present remain unseen. It was for faith that our ancestors were commended.

It was by faith that Abraham obeyed the call to set out for a country that was the inheritance given to him and his descendants, and that he set out without knowing where he was going. By faith he arrived, as a foreigner, in the Promised Land, and lived there as if in a strange country, with Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise. They lived there in tents while he looked forward to a city founded, designed and built by God.

It was equally by faith that Sarah, in spite of being past the age, was made able to conceive, because she believed that he who had made the promise would be faithful to it. Because of this, there came from one man, and one who was already as good as dead himself, more descendants than could be counted, as many as the stars of heaven or the grains of sand on the seashore.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (12:35-40)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'See that you are dressed for action and have your lamps lit. Be like men waiting for their master to return from the wedding feast, ready to open the door as soon as he comes and knocks. Happy those servants whom the master finds awake when he comes. I tell you solemnly, he will put on an apron, sit them down at table and wait on them. It may be in the second watch he comes, or in the third, but happy those servants if he finds them ready. You may be quite sure of this, that if the householder had known at what hour the burglar would come, he would not have let anyone break through the wall of his house. You too must stand ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect.'

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION:

Jesus was well aware of the uncertainty of life. His parable stresses the fact that death can come at any moment. It isn't that God tries to catch us unawares like a thief in the night. That would be unthinkable. Death, not God, is the thief that robs us of life.

This unexpectedness can be a grace. It forces us to be prepared at all times. However, this uncertainty shouldn't prevent us from enjoying life in the present. Quite the opposite. When we become aware of the fragility of our existence, we realise that each moment is precious.

I'm sure that all of us would like to end life with our plans carried out and our work completed. But we don't know if we'll have that chance. What we do have is an opportunity to be faithful to our responsibilities and commitments on a daily basis.

We might remember the lovely words of Mother Teresa: "We are not called to be successful, only to be faithful.'
