Liturgy of the Eucharist-Eucharistic Prayer Part 1

Once we begin the Eucharistic Prayer, we have the invocation of the Holy Spirit upon the gifts of bread and wine, placed on the altar. This is important as we are calling down the Spirit of God on these gifts and we ask God to breathe in to these gifts to make them more than bread and wine, taking us way back to the beginning of the biblical story. God, we are told, picks up a lump of earth – good, rich soil – and then breathes His breath, His Spirit, into the soil, creating the human being. We're asking God, to do what you have done before. Breathe upon these gifts to make them more than bread and wine. Transform these gifts by the power of your Spirit into the body and blood of Jesus Christ crucified and risen. Then we tell the story the Last Supper. 'Take this all of you and eat of it, for this is My Body'. We believe, that the word of Jesus has power enough to take bread and wine and transform them into the Body and Blood of Jesus crucified and risen. Just as the breath of God transformed a lump of soil to become the human being, just as the breath of God became the power that transformed the early Church from a cringing crowd into a powerful missionary community. The promise is made of the transformation of everything. Of us, our lives,

all that we've brought with the bread and wine,

even the cosmos itself will be transfigured.

A reading from the book of Jeremiah 38:4-6, 8-10

The king's leading men spoke to the king. 'Let Jeremiah be put to death: he is unquestionably disheartening the remaining soldiers in the city, and all the people too, by talking like this. The fellow does not have the welfare of this people at heart so much as its ruin.' 'He is in your hands as you know,' King Zedekiah answered 'for the king is powerless against you.' So they took Jeremiah and threw him into the well of Prince Malchiah in the Court of the Guard, letting him down with ropes. There was no water in the well, only mud, and into the mud Jeremiah sank. Ebed-melech came out from the palace and spoke to the king. 'My lord king,' he said, 'these men have done a wicked thing by treating the prophet Jeremiah like this: they have thrown him into the well where he will die.' At this the king gave Ebed-melech the Cushite the following order: 'Take three men with you from here and pull the prophet Jeremiah out of the well before he dies.'

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews 12:1-4

With so many witnesses in a great cloud on every side of us, we too, then, should throw off everything that hinders us, especially the sin that clings so easily, and keep running steadily in the race we have started. Let us not lose sight of Jesus, who leads us in our faith and brings it to perfection: for the sake of the joy which was still in the future, he endured the cross, disregarding the shamefulness of it, and from now on has taken his place at the right of God's throne. Think of the way he stood such opposition from sinners and then you will not give up for want of courage. In the fight against sin, you have not yet had to keep fighting to the point of death.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! My sheep listen to my voice, says the Lord; I know them, and they follow me. **Alleluia!** *A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke* 12:49-53

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I have come to bring fire to the earth, and how I wish it were blazing already! There is a baptism I must still receive, and how great is my distress till it is over! 'Do you suppose that I am here to bring peace on earth? No, I tell you, but rather division. For from now on a household of five will be divided: three against two and two against three; the father divided against the son, son against father, mother against daughter against mother, mother-in-law against daughter-in-law, daughter-in-law against mother-in-law.'

<u>Scripture Reflection:</u>

The Gospel contains two sayings about the nature of Jesus' mission, using images of fire, baptism and division (the sword). The image of Fire has a long history in the bible and is one of purification, not destruction. Baptism is what Jesus was required to do as part of God's redemptive plan. Division is not the intention of Christ's presence on earth, more that people must choose to be for or against the light. In early times conversion to Christianity sometimes tore families apart and the convert was rejected by their family. It was a hard choice. In our times this is rarely the case, but what is an issue is the question of loyalty to one's clan, tribe or country. For most people this is a core value. The essence in Christianity is that loyalty to Christ takes precedence over all other loyalties and can be costly. If Jesus said only 'nice' things to people he would have made himself popular. However, his words shocked some and infuriated others by challenging the status quo. We betray the gospel if we reduce it to a bland message to all, which ignores the difference between rich and poor. Jesus' sense of justice brought him into conflict with those who exploited the weak and the poor. His integrity brought him into conflict with the dishonest. His tolerance brought him into conflict with the narrow-minded and bigoted. The Gospel message is a fire that purifies: it is the leaven of society and the worlds. A fire not only needs to be kindled but also tended. We are the tenders of that fire.
