We have 38 candidates preparing, over the next few weeks from our community, to deepen and take more responsibility of their faith in readiness to receive the



Plenary Snippet: One Plenary Council, 2 Assemblies. The Plenary Council will take place over two assemblies, or sessions, October 3 – 10, 2021 and July 4 – 9, 2022. The expectation is that the first assembly will generate new bold ideas, some of which will be chosen to act on. As the partial Plenary timeline shows, the time between the two sessions will be used to prayerfully and carefully research and develop these ideas into activities that can be actioned. At the second assembly, firm ideas or proposals will be reviewed and voted upon. Once Plenary Council concludes, preparation for enacting the decisions will start. This is what is expected, but we, the Australian Church, are asking the Holy Spirit to direct the actions of the Council, so anything could happen.

Bishop Greg announced on Tuesday that Fr Bernard Buckley, is well enough to take up a new Parish appointment. He writes, "The prayers of so many have accompanied Fr Bernard throughout recent years as he confronted and attended to serious health concerns. At this time Fr Bernard is in a position to resume ministry. He is mindful of the precautions required of him to ensure he does not put at risk the achievements made through the medical care he continues to receive." The appointment is to St John's Trafalgar, beginning at the end of this month. The current Parish Priest there, Fr Bernie Krotwaar, will retire due to ongoing health issues. It was his silver jubilee of ordination on Tuesday. Bernie is just 64. We hope and pray he has a fruitful 'third stage' of priesthood, as he provides a pastoral presence for the residents and staff at Andrews House in Trafalgar.

Entrance Antiphon

A reading from the book of Deuteronomy (4:1-2,6-8)

Moses said to the people: 'Now, Israel, take notice of the laws and customs that I teach you today, and observe them, that you may have life and may enter and take possession of the land that the Lord the God of your fathers is giving you. You must add nothing to what I command you, and take nothing from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God just as I lay them down for you. When they come to know of all these laws they will exclaim, "No other people is as wise and prudent as this great nation." And indeed, what great nation is there that has its gods so near as the Lord our God that has laws and customs to match this whole Law that I put before you today?'

A reading from the letter of St James (1:17-18, 21-22, 27)

It is all that is good, everything that is perfect, which is given us from above; it comes down from the Father of all light; with him there is no such thing as alteration, no shadow of a change. By his own choice he made us his children by the message of the truth so that we should be a sort of first-fruits of all that he had created.

Accept and submit to the word which has been planted in you and can save your souls. But you must do what the word tells you, and not just listen to it and deceive yourselves.

Pure, unspoilt religion, in the eyes of God our Father is this: coming to the help of orphans and widows when they need it, and keeping oneself uncontaminated by the world.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (7: 1-8, 14-15, 21-23)

The Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered round Jesus, and they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with unclean hands, that is, without washing them. For the Pharisees, and the Jews in general, follow the tradition of the elders and never eat without washing their arms as far as the elbow; and on returning from the market place they never eat without first sprinkling themselves. There are also many other observances which have been handed down to them concerning the washing of cups and pots and bronze dishes. So these Pharisees and scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not respect the tradition of the elders but eat their food with unclean hands?' He answered, 'It was of you hypocrites that Isaiah so rightly prophesied in this passage of scripture:

This people honours me only with lip-service, while their hearts are far from me.

The worship they offer me is worthless, the doctrines they teach are only human regulations.

You put aside the commandment of God to cling to human traditions.'

He called the people to him again and said, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand. Nothing that goes into a man from outside can make him unclean; it is the things that come out of a man that make him unclean. For it is from within, from men's hearts, that evil intentions emerge: fornication, theft, murder, adultery, avarice, malice, deceit, indecency, envy, slander, pride, folly. All these things come from within and make a man unclean.'

Scripture Notes

The Pharisees saw evil as something outside themselves- in things and especially in other people. If evil was outside themselves then they could protect themselves from it by avoiding contact with people, or where this was not possible then with ritual washings. They were a sincere people. However, their focus was on outer cleanliness and neglect of cleanliness of heart. Jesus said that the source of evil is within us. We can't guard ourselves from it by separation from others. The seeds of all those evil things he lists are within us all, and what makes us unclean in God's eyes. This truth is disturbing and a great problem of our time – a failure to know ourselves; to recognise and deal with it within ourselves.

Today there is a huge preoccupation with body image at the expense of attending to what is within our hearts.

Similarly, people can be present in church in voice only so their worship becomes mere lip-service. Real presence has the heart at its centre and spoken words flow from there. If forgiveness and peace are not spoken from the heart they will not result in true reconciliation and peace.
