Plenary Council Agenda: The agenda is made up of 16 questions covering the six topics that came out of the listening and discernment process. The fourth topic is STRUCTURES

- How might parishes better become local centres for the formation and animation of missionary disciples?
- How might the Church in Australia be better structured for mission, considering the parish, the diocese, religious orders, the PJPs and new communities?

In just over two weeks the long awaited Plenary Council of Australia will commence. Due to the ongoing pandemic, instead of meeting physically, the 278 Members will be meeting virtually from across Australia. Members are drawn from dioceses, eparchies, ordinariates, personal prelature, leaders of religious congregations and representatives of church ministries, seminary rectors and heads of theological institutions. In addition, there are additional people who will serve the Plenary Council in the key roles of periti (expert advisors), canonical experts, and those involved in the drafting and recording of proceedings. 

Entrance Antiphon

I am the salvation of the people, says the Lord. Should they cry to me in any distress, I will hear them, and I will be their Lord for ever.

A reading from book of Wisdom (2:12, 17-20)

The godless say to themselves, 'Let us lie in wait for the virtuous man, since he annoys us and opposes our way of life, reproaches us for our breaches of the law and accuses us of playing false to our upbringing. Let us see if what he says is true, let us observe what kind of end he himself will have. If the virtuous man is God's son, God will take his part and rescue him from the clutches of his enemies. Let us test him with cruelty and with torture, and thus explore this gentleness of his and put his endurance to the proof. Let us condemn him to a shameful death since he will be looked after - we have his word for it.

Responsorial Psalm

R. The Lord upholds my life.

- 1. O God, save me by your name; by your power, uphold my cause. O God, hear my prayer; listen to the words of my mouth. **R.**
- 2. For proud men have risen against me, ruthless men seek my life. They have no regard for God. **R.**
- 3. But I have God for my help. The Lord upholds my life. I will sacrifice to you with willing heart and praise your name for it is good. **R.**

<u>A reading from the letter of St James</u> (3:16 – 4:3)

Wherever you find jealousy and ambition, you find disharmony, and wicked things of every kind being done; whereas the wisdom that comes down from above is essentially something pure; it also makes for peace, and is kindly and considerate; it is full of compassion and shows itself by doing good; nor is there any trace of partiality or hypocrisy in it. Peacemakers, when they work for peace, sow the seeds which will bear fruit in holiness. Where do these wars and battles between yourselves first start? Isn't it precisely in the desires fighting inside your own selves? You want something and you haven't got it; so you are prepared to kill. You have an ambition that you cannot satisfy; so you fight to get your way by force. Why you don't have what you want is because you don't pray for it; when you do pray and don't get it, it is because you have not prayed properly, you have prayed for something to indulge your own desires.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, Alleluia!

God has called us with the gospel to share in the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. Alleluia!

<u>A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark</u> (9:30-37)

After leaving the mountain Jesus and his disciples made their way through Galilee; and he did not want anyone to know, because he was instructing his disciples; he was telling them, 'The Son of Man will be delivered into the hands of men; they will put him to death; and three days after he has been put to death he will rise again.' But they did not understand what he said and were afraid to ask him.

They came to Capernaum, and when he was in the house he asked them, 'What were you arguing about on the road?' They said nothing because they had been arguing which of them was the greatest. So he sat down, called the Twelve to him and said, 'If anyone wants to be first, he must make himself last of all and servant of all.' He then took a little child, set him in front of them, put his arms round him, and said to them, 'Anyone who welcomes one of these little children in my name, welcomes me; and anyone who welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me.'

This passage predicts the Passion, with Jesus telling his disciples that he will suffer bitter humiliation and death. However, the disciples don't understand.

In the second reading James contrasts the 'wisdom' of the ungodly giving rise to rivalry, disharmony and fighting as opposed to the wisdom of God leading to gentleness, compassion, and peace.

Strife is caused by unruly passions and uncontrolled desires. This is because humans are basically selfish. We tend to pigeonhole people according to the work that they do, putting the job or position ahead of the person. It is not what I do but what I am that is important.

One's self-worth should not depend on the work one does. If we want to feel proud of ourselves, we must do things that we are proud of. Feelings follow actions. The best prize life has to offer is the chance to work at something that is worth doing, and that transcends oneself and one's own interests.

Jesus tells us what the deeds of love and service are, and sets us an example.

Christ was victorious not by avoiding evil, but by confronting and overcoming it. He gives courage and hope to all who sacrifice themselves for others in the cause of right.

God never abandons the upright, but their reward is in the life to come.
