Everyone has been keenly anticipating our economy opening up and provision for visiting loved ones again. However, with that comes some anxiety now that we are moving towards a 'COVID-normal' society.

Our churches will be open according to the State government requirements of the 4 square metre rule and proof of double vaccination. St Mary's church will have a cap of 110 for Mass. And, 25 at both Paynesville and Lindenow.

Introductory Rites – Greeting

The first thing we do really even before the Introductory Rite, is prepare ourselves, to move into sacred space and sacred time, into the presence of God. You see this in the great basilicas of Rome where you move through different spaces before you enter the Holy of Holies, as it were. Even physically. At Mass we prepare ourselves beforehand, in prayer. But then when the community gathers, we begin with the sign of the cross. Now we begin in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, as a way of saying we are entering into sacred space and sacred time. We're not exactly leaving our everyday life but we're entering into another depth and the depth we're entering into is the depth of the Trinity because, again, it's God who gathers us. We might decide to go to Mass but, in the end, it's God who is calling us to share His own life. And the life of God is what we call the Trinity which is perfect communion – a love that is completely unshadowed. And then the priest greets the people who have entered that sacred space and sacred time, the presence of God, with words taken from the New Testament. And so much of the language of the Mass is biblical. The words of scripture are sacred words. They're words born of the Trinity. So therefore the priest, who isn't just himself, when he puts on the vestments he becomes something more than himself – he remains himself but he becomes a figure of Christ in the midst of God's people, and speaking words that are not his own, words that are given to him to speak, from the New Testament: "The Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the Communion of the Holy Spirit be with you." And the people respond: "And with your spirit." This is the language of Communion, it's the language born of the Trinity. And that's where we start.

A reading from the letter to the Hebrews (7:23-28)

There used to be a great number of priests under the former covenant, because death put an end to each one of them; but this one, Christ, because he remains for ever, can never lose his priesthood. It follows then, that his power to save is utterly certain, since he is living for ever to intercede for all who come to God through him. To suit us, the ideal high priest would have to be holy, innocent and uncontaminated, beyond the influence of sinners, and raised up above the heavens; one who would not need to offer sacrifices every day, as the other high priests do for their own sins and then for those of the people, because he has done this once and for all by offering himself. The Law appoints high priests who are men subject to weakness; but the promise on oath, which came after the Law, appointed the Son who is made perfect for ever.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (12:28-34)

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

Scripture Notes

The Rabbis had identified nearly 700 laws in the Scriptures. This sounds a lot but actually compares favourably with the Catholic Church which has 2000 in the Church's code of canonical law and many others governing the celebration of sacraments. Both the commandments Jesus named are found in the Old testament, combining them as no one else had. They are interrelated. True love of neighbour springs from the love of God and no true love of God that does not express itself in love of neighbour. They cannot be separated. In Leviticus the 'neighbour' is restricted to fellow Israelites, however Jesus broadened it, to include EVERYONE! Failure to love is the greatest failure of a Christian. Sin is recognised when it means doing harm to a 'neighbour' but the sin of failing to love or withholding love is equivalent. It is a great danger for church going people that they see no connection between what they do in church on a Sunday and what they do in relation to a 'neighbour' on weekdays. For such people religion is divorced from life and just a private matter between them and God. According to the Bible a religion like that is an abomination. If we have a problem with a particular person we should avoid any retaliation, try to keep some form of ongoing communication, (even just a Good day), and we should pray for that person.

To offer sacrifice to God is a great thing. But to show mercy to a fellow human being is even greater and harder. Each one of us, daily, stands in need of God's mercy. Deep compassion combined with true religion is a powerful combination, and when we truly experience it, we are transformed.
