



Every 2 weeks we will, together with Archbishop Mark, share with you each part of the Mass. The series can be found on YouTube>Archdiocese of Brisbane/playlist>The Mass Series. Liturgy of the Eucharist: The Fraction

After the sign of Peace, the priest 'breaks the bread' which has become the Body of Christ, and he breaks it, remembering that the body of Jesus was broken for us. The bread must be broken so that it can be shared by everyone, just as the body of Jesus had to be broken on the cross for the whole world to share the life of God. The breaking of the bread remembers the death of Christ, that brought life to the world nourishes us today. It is looking back, but also looking to what we are called to be and do now and, in the future, as part of the Body of Christ. When the priest says: "Behold the Lamb of God, the Lamb of Sacrifice", it takes us back to the book of Exodus, when the slaves are liberated from Egypt where they ate the lamb of the Passover. Jesus is the Lamb and He now is the feast, we are about to share. "Blessed are those who are called to the Supper of the Lamb", language of the New Testament, the Book of Revelation, looking to the end of time when God will be all in all, and there will only be the joy of the feast.

The Opening Prayer

Almighty and merciful God, graciously keep from us all adversity, so that, unhindered in mind and body alike, we may pursue in freedom of heart the things that are yours. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A reading from the second book of Maccabees 7:1-2, 9-14

There were seven brothers who were arrested with their mother. The king tried to force them to taste pig's flesh, which the Law forbids, by torturing them with whips and scourges. One of them, acting as spokesman for the others, said, 'What are you trying to find out from us? We are prepared to die rather than break the Law of our ancestors.' With his last breath the second brother exclaimed, 'Inhuman fiend, you may discharge us from this present life, but the King of the world will raise us up, since it is for his laws that we die, to live again for ever.' After him, they amused themselves with the third, who on being asked for his tongue promptly thrust it out and boldly held out his hands, with these honourable words, 'It was heaven that gave me these limbs; for the sake of his laws I disdain them; from him I hope to receive them again.' The king and his attendants were astounded at the young man's courage and his utter indifference to suffering. When this one was dead they subjected the fourth to the same savage torture. When he neared his end he cried, 'Ours is the better choice, to meet death at men's hands, yet relying on God's promise that we shall be raised up by him; whereas for you there can be no resurrection, no new life.'

R. Lord, when your glory appears, my joy will be full.

Lord, hear a cause that is just, pay heed to my cry. Turn your ear to my prayer: no deceit is on my lips. **R**. I kept my feet firmly in your paths; there was no faltering in my steps. I am here and I call, you will hear me, O God. Turn your ear to me; hear my words. **R**.

Guard me as the apple of your eye. Hide me in the shadow of your wings.

A reading from the second letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians 2:16 - 3:5

May our Lord Jesus Christ himself, and God our Father who has given us his love and, through his grace, such inexhaustible comfort and such sure hope, comfort you and strengthen you in everything good that you do or say. Finally, brothers, pray for us; pray that the Lord's message may spread quickly, and be received with honour as it was among you; and pray that we may be preserved from the interference of bigoted and evil people, for faith is not given to everyone. But the Lord is faithful, and he will give you strength and guard you from the evil one, and we, in the Lord, have every confidence that you are doing and will go on doing all that we tell you. May the Lord turn your hearts towards the love of God and the fortitude of Christ.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Jesus Christ is the firstborn of the dead; glory and kingship be his for ever and ever. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke 20:27, 34-38

Some Sadducees - those who say that there is no resurrection - approached Jesus and they put this question to him. Jesus replied, 'The children of this world take wives and husbands, but those who are judged worthy of a place in the other world and in the resurrection from the dead do not marry because they can no longer die, for they are the same as the angels, and being children of the resurrection they are sons of God. And Moses himself implies that the dead rise again, in the passage about the bush where he calls the Lord the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob. Now he is God, not of the dead, but of the living; for to him all men are in fact alive.'

Scripture Reflection:

As we journey through life, we become more aware of how fleeting and precarious our time on earth is, and are often forced to think about death. This can be a positive thing as it can result in a true love of life, accepting each day as a gift. Our Christian faith is the one thing that helps us to confront the inescapable reality of death. Belief in an afterlife is one of the most important beliefs we have as Christians. Without it, life would be a journey to nowhere. With it, life becomes a journey to the promised land. To have faith does not mean that we have all the answers. Faith is trust, not certainty, and involves absolute trust in God. We know nothing of the mystery of the beyond, but we do know that life after death is not just a continuation of this life. It utterly transcends the life we know now, as Jesus tells us in the Gospel, and should enable us to live out joyfully the mystery of our fragile human condition.
