WORD OF GOD



In September 2019, Pope Francis instituted the celebration of the Sunday of the Word of God in his Apostolic Letter *Aperuit Illis* to encourage the celebration, study and dissemination of the Word of God. While most countries will celebrate the day on the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time, the Catholic Church in Australia celebrates the Sunday of the Word of God on the first Sunday in February each year, starting with February 7 in

2021. Fr Michael promoted it last week. Visit www.catholic.org.au/wordofgodsunday to access resources to help commemorate the day and for suggestions on how to better engage with Sacred Scripture in various ways and settings.

GOSPEL REFLECTION:

Ralph Waldo Emerson was a hugely influential lecturer, essayist and poet, becoming one of America's most vital voices. He was a fierce foe of slavery and political corruption. In one of his essays he highlights something of great relevance to today's Gospel: "Only so much do I know as I have lived. I learn immediately from any speaker how much he has lived. One person speaks *from within*, or experience, as a possessor of the fact; another speaks *from without*, as a spectator, or as acquainted with facts on the evidence from a third person. It is no use to preach to me from without. I can do that myself." Jesus' teaching made a deep impression on the people because, unlike the scribes, (official teachers, who did not express any opinion of their own), he taught from within, with authority, transparency and freshness in a degree that transcended all others. It is important to distinguish between authority and influence on one hand, and power and control on the other. Some of the people with the

greatest moral authority are quite powerless, and the most influential have no need to control those they influence. One can have all the authority in the world, and still fail as a teacher. We hear a cry numerous times in the Gospel from people who believe they were possessed by devils. 'Don't meddle with us. Leave us alone. Don't try to change us.' They recognised that change is painful. Whether they were actually possessed by devils we do not know. But what we do know is that they were sick, broken, isolated, unloved people, who had no dignity or self-worth. There are many such people in our world today, in prisons, psychiatric units, refugee camps and so on. Any one of us can be caught in a desperate situation. The man in the synagogue did not try to hide how he was. In the cry,' Leave me alone" Jesus heard a cry for help, and he cured him. People find it hard to admit that they can't manage their problems.

Recognising the problem is the first step towards rehabilitation. It is the courageous that ask for help or go for counselling. When we have the courage to face our problems, new creative energies become available to us. Fear, shame and guilt often make us stay in isolation. It is by showing our wounds, by allowing ourselves to touch and be touched that we are healed. It is in our brokenness, our woundedness, that God heals us - if we give Him the chance.

I would like to see you free from all worry. An unmarried man can devote himself to the Lord's affairs, all he need worry about is pleasing the Lord; but a married man has to bother about the world's affairs and devote himself to pleasing his wife: he is torn two ways. In the same way an unmarried woman, like a young girl, can devote herself to the Lord's affairs; all she need worry about is being holy in body and spirit. The married woman, on the other hand, has to worry about the world's affairs and devote herself to pleasing her husband. I say this only to help you, not to put a halter round your necks, but simply to make sure that everything is as it should be, and that you give your undivided attention to the Lord.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (1: 21-28)

Jesus and his followers went as far as Capernaum, and as soon as the Sabbath came Jesus went to the synagogue and began to teach. And his teaching made a deep impression on them because, unlike the scribes, he taught them with authority.

In their synagogue just then there was a man possessed by an unclean spirit, and it shouted, 'What do you want with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are: the Holy One of God.' But Jesus said sharply, 'Be quiet! Come out of him!' And the unclean spirit threw the man into convulsions and with a loud cry went out of him. The people were so astonished that they started asking each other what it all meant. 'Here is a teaching that is new' they said 'and with authority behind it: he gives orders even to unclean spirits and they obey him.' And his reputation rapidly spread everywhere, through all the surrounding Galilean countryside.
