AUSTRALIAN CHURCH'S 2021 SAFEGUARDING REPORT

In late December last year the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference and Catholic Religious Australia published their fourth annual progress report on efforts undertaken to improve child safety. The report has been issued yearly since 2018 on recommendation of the **Royal Commission into Institutional** Responses to Child Sexual Abuse. The annual report details national initiatives of the Church to embed child and adult safeguarding practices, including through the establishment of ACSL, through to initiatives being undertaken at the local level of dioceses and religious institutes across the country. Quote of the Day on Synodality

"I prefer a Church which is bruised, hurting and dirty because it has been out on the streets, rather than a Church which is unhealthy from being confined and from clinging to its own security."

Evangelii Gaudium, 'The Joy of the Gospel' (#49)

We are missionary disciples (Evangelii Gaudium 119-121; 48-49) To encounter Jesus is to be sent forth to proclaim him joyfully: "We have found the Messiah!" (Jn 1:41). This is evangelisation: sharing the Good News of Jesus Christ in my life. Pope Francis makes the point that evangelisation is not to be left to the "professionals" while the rest of us are passive recipients. Through baptism every Christian is challenged to be actively engaged in evangelisation, and there is a certain urgency about this calling. (EG 120) Indeed, anyone who has truly experienced God's saving love does not need much time or lengthy training to go out and proclaim that love. (EG 120) Think of St Paul. After his encounter with Jesus he "immediately proclaimed Jesus" (Acts 9:20).

THE MASS SERIES – by Archbishop Mark Coleridge of the Archdiocese of Brisbane

Every 2 weeks we will, together with Archbishop Mark, share with you each part of the Mass. The series can be found on YouTube>Archdiocese of Brisbane/playlist>The Mass Series

Once the Introductory Rites are complete, we begin the first of the two great sections of the Mass - the Liturgy of the Word—which is the Word of God speaking to the heart of God's people and doing so primarily through scripture. The Bible was composed by human beings, not dropped magically from some pink cloud. What we say, is that in these human words, is contained the Word of the God who always takes flesh even in the words of a book. So, if we really listen, a voice can be heard which is the voice of God. In this moment, God wants to enter into a conversation with His people. He speaks to us a word that is old but always new. We have to listen with the ears of faith and enter into the conversation. The first reading is usually taken from the Old Testament. Sometimes, in calling it the Old Testament we can give the impression that it's really old and worn out. But that's not true. The Old Testament, is as much the Word of God to us here and now as it ever was, addressed to people thousands of years ago. Once God speaks to us through that first reading, we listen, and then we respond with the Responsorial Psalm- our response to the word that God has spoken, continuing the conversation. Then the second reading continues the conversation. Again God speaks, now through one of the texts of the New Testament — one of the letters of St Paul. The words are St Paul's, but at a deeper point there is God's voice, (Jesus Christ's voice), through Paul. We then sing the Alleluia preparing to hear the words of Christ Himself. Alleluia simply means "Praise God" for the gift of the words Christ speaks to us in the Gospel. This is the epicentre of this Liturgy of the Word.

Scripture Notes

The first reading tells us of Isaiah's call to the charism of prophecy after God reveals himself, evoking in Isaiah a sense of his own sinfulness. Then cleansed of his sins he responds without hesitation. In the second reading Paul defends the reality of the resurrection of Jesus. The resurrection is not described as it was realised that it was a happening beyond our experience.

Peter was profoundly moved by the miracle, declared himself unworthy, but symbolises what can be achieved with Jesus' help.

This story is about God's call-a call to a life of sacrifice and service of others. The quality of people's lives is affected by what is asked of them. A vocation means serving others.

The disciples were ordinary sinful people like us all, but Jesus would not allow them to opt out because of this, He saw potential in them and called to their strengths. Peter and his companions had their failures as we do too. But we must not allow ourselves to be discouraged by our weaknesses or demoralised by our failures. All we need is some of that trust in the Lord that Peter had.

A reading from the prophet Isaiah (6:1-8)

In the year of King Uzziah's death I saw the Lord seated on a high throne; his train filled the sanctuary; above him stood seraphs, each one with six wings. And they cried out one to another in this way, 'Holy, holy, holy is the Lord of hosts. His glory fills the whole earth.' The foundations of the threshold shook with the voice of the one who cried out, and the Temple was filled with smoke. I said: 'What a wretched state I am in! I am lost, for I am a man of unclean lips and I live among a people of unclean lips, and my eyes have looked at the King, the Lord of hosts.'

Then one of the seraphs flew to me, holding in his hand a live coal which he had taken from the altar with a pair of tongs. With this he touched my mouth and said: 'See now, this has touched your lips, your sin is taken away, your iniquity is purged.' Then I heard the voice of the Lord saying: 'Whom shall I send? Who will be our messenger?' I answered, 'Here I am, send me.'

Responsorial Psalm

R. In the sight of the angels I will sing your praises, Lord.

I thank you, Lord, with all my heart, you have heard the words of my mouth. Before the angels I will bless you. I will adore before your holy temple. **R**

I thank you for your faithfulness and love which excel all we ever knew of you. On the day I called, you answered; you increased the strength of my soul. **R.**

All earth's kings shall thank you when they hear the words of your mouth. They shall sing of the Lord's ways: 'How great is the glory of the Lord!' R.

You stretch out your hand and save me, your hand will do all things for me. Your love, O Lord, is eternal, discard not the work of your hands **R.**

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (15:1-11)

Brothers, I want to remind you of the gospel I preached to you, the gospel that you received and in which you are firmly established; because the gospel will save you only if you keep believing exactly what I preached to you - believing anything else will not lead to anything.

Well then, in the first place, I taught you what I had been taught myself, namely that Christ died for our sins, in accordance with the scriptures; that he was buried; and that he was raised to life on the third day, in accordance with the scriptures; that he appeared first to Cephas and secondly to the Twelve. Next he appeared to more than five hundred of the brothers at the same time, most of whom are still alive, though some have died; then he appeared to James, and then to all the apostles; and last of all he appeared to me too; it was as though I was born when no one expected it. I am the least of the apostles; in fact, since I persecuted the Church of God, I hardly deserve the name apostle; but by God's grace that is what I am, and the grace that he gave me has not been fruitless. On the contrary, I, or rather the grace of God that is with me, have worked harder than any of the others; but what matters is that I preach what they preach, and this is what you all believed.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, Alleluia!

Come follow me, says the Lord, and I will make you fishers of my people. Alleluia!

A Reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke (5:1-11)

Jesus was standing one day by the Lake of Gennesaret, with the crowd pressing round him listening to the word of God, when he caught sight of two boats close to the bank. The fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. He got into one of the boats - it was Simon's - and asked him to put out a little from the shore. Then he sat down and taught the crowds from the boat.

When he had finished speaking he said to Simon, 'Put out into deep water and pay out your nets for a catch.' 'Master,' Simon replied 'we worked hard all night long and caught nothing, but if you say so, I will pay out the nets.' And when they had done this they netted such a huge number of fish that their nets began to tear, so they signalled to their companions in the other boat to come and help them; when these came, they filled the two boats to sinking point.

When Simon Peter saw this he fell at the knees of Jesus saying, 'Leave me, Lord; I am a sinful man.' For he and all his companions were completely overcome by the catch they had made; so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were Simon's partners. But Jesus said to Simon,

'Do not be afraid; from now on it is men you will catch.' Then, bringing their boats back to land, they left everything and followed him.

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
