
The Church in Australia celebrates the **Sunday of the Word of God on the first Sunday in February – February 7 in 2021**.

Entrance Antiphon:

O come, let us worship God and bow low before the God who made us, for he is the Lord our God.

A Reading from the prophet Job (7: 1-4, 6-7)

Job began to speak: Is not man's life on earth nothing more than pressed service, his time no better than hired drudgery? Like the slave, sighing for the shade, or the workman with no thought but his wages, months of delusion I have assigned to me, nothing for my own but nights of grief. Lying in bed I wonder, 'When will it be day?' Risen I think, 'How slowly evening comes!' Restlessly I fret till twilight falls. Swifter than a weaver's shuttle my days have passed, and vanished, leaving no hope behind. Remember that my life is but a breath, and that my eyes will never again see joy.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians (9: 16-19, 22-23)

I do not boast of preaching the gospel, since it is a duty which has been laid on me; I should be punished if I did not preach it! If I had chosen this work myself, I might have been paid for it, but as I have not, it is a responsibility which has been put into my hands. Do you know what my reward is? It is this: in my preaching, to be able to offer the Good News free, and not insist on the rights which the gospel gives me. So though I am not a slave of any man I have made myself the slave of everyone so as to win as many as I could. For the weak I made myself weak. I made myself all things to all men in order to save some at any cost; and I still do this, for the sake of the gospel, to have a share in its blessing.

A Reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark (1: 29-39)

On leaving the synagogue, Jesus went with James and John straight to the house of Simon and Andrew. Now Simon's mother-in-law had gone to bed with fever, and they told him about her straightaway. He went to her, took her by the hand and helped her up. And the fever left her and she began to wait on them. That evening, after sunset, they brought to him all who were sick and those who were possessed by devils. The whole town came crowding round the door, and he cured many who were suffering from diseases of one kind or another; he also cast out many devils, but he would not allow them to speak, because they knew who he was.

In the morning, long before dawn, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place and prayed there. Simon and his companions set out in search of him, and when they found him they said, 'Everybody is looking for you.' He answered, 'Let us go elsewhere, to the neighbouring country towns, so that I can preach there too, because that is why I came.' And he went all through Galilee, preaching in their synagogues and casting out devils.

Jerusalem Bible

The Gospel of the Lord.
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Scripture Notes

In the Old testament suffering was seen as a punishment from God for sin. Jesus did not accept this. God does not do evil. God does good. What we see in the Gospel is not so much an answer to the question of 'why suffering?', but as Jesus' response to actual suffering, which was a very practical one. We see Jesus surrounded by throngs of physically and mentally sick people. He gives himself to each of them, making himself totally vulnerable before the wounded and sick. Suffering is a lonely condition. Jesus was not sentimental about suffering and he did not preach resignation as we often do. He had compassion on sufferers and made them well. His care of the suffering became an opportunity to show what God is like, revealing God's compassion in the face of human suffering. The suffering of others is an opportunity for us too. We may not be able to cure, but it is always within our power to care, which is a very healing thing. It is no easy thing because it means that instead of relieving someone's pain, we have to be prepared to share it.

Jesus also takes 'timeout ' to pray. He was surrounded by those suffering and clamouring for him. He was in danger of being consumed. 'Early in the morning, he got up and left the house, and went off to a lonely place to pray'. Jesus prayed out of a sense of duty but also out of need. Activity can become a disease so that one doesn't have a moment to oneself. Only by paying careful attention to our own physical, emotional, mental and spiritual needs can we remain joyful givers.

The most beneficial prayer of all is to just be in the presence of God, without saying or doing anything.

We need to learn from Jesus how to combine action and contemplation.
