

Sale Diocese-Diocesan Facilities Co-ordinator

The Bishop of Sale is seeking to appoint a Facilities Coordinator on a part time basis of 4 days per fortnight (0.4 FTE) to assist Parishes in the management of Parish Church facilities. The appointee will be responsible to the Bishop of Sale through the Business Manager. The Facilities Coordinator has responsibility for working with Parishes to ensure the maintenance of Church buildings and other Parish facilities, ensure compliance with essential safety, have a process to identify hazards, and compliance with Occupation Health and Safety in the maintenance of Church properties. The successful candidate will ideally commence early to mid-June with a handover from the current Facilities Co-ordinator who is retiring. The appointee is expected to demonstrate a commitment to, and support of the mission of the Catholic Church in the Diocese of Sale and a commitment to the safety and wellbeing of children. A high level of professionalism, capacity to work autonomously, initiative and superior communication skills is required in this key role. Ideally the successful candidate would have experience in the building industry, engineering, or project managemen

Refugees released from detention

In early April the remaining men imprisoned in Melbourne's Park Hotel were released into the community. Over the 2nd, 7th and 8th April, it is estimated that 44 others have also been released



from detention centres around Australia. Advocates continue to implore the Federal Government to release the remaining estimated six people who were transferred from offshore detention for medical reasons.

Many who were released from the Park Hotel had spent over nine years in arbitrary immigration detention. They have reported to the media that they are looking forward to starting their 'new life'. Some will be provided with a Final Departure Bridging Visa, with temporary transitional support, while others will be released into community detention.

Some of the released men were provided with a one-off payment and up to three-weeks of temporary accommodation – then they are expected to support themselves.. For many, the ability to work and earn an income is compounded by ongoing physical and mental issues; many of which have been exacerbated by their prolonged detention.

Former Park Hotel detainee Mehdi has expressed his concern that these decisions were politically motivated as we approach a Federal Election –

instead of being motivated by human rights obligations. Mehdi and his cousin Adnan were only 15 years old when they were first detained within Australia's offshore processing system. They were recently released,

The Opening Prayer

Almighty ever-living God, constantly accomplish the Paschal Mystery within us, that those you were pleased to make new in Holy Baptism may, under your protective care, bear much fruit and come to the joys of life eternal. Who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever. Amen.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles 14:21-27

Paul and Barnabas went back through Lystra and Iconium to Antioch. They put fresh heart into the disciples, encouraging them to persevere in the faith. 'We all have to experience many hardships' they said 'before we enter the kingdom of God.' In each of these churches they appointed elders, and with prayer and fasting they commended them to the Lord in whom they had come to believe. They passed through Pisidia and reached Pamphylia. Then after proclaiming the word at Perga they went down to Attalia and from there sailed for Antioch, where they had originally been commended to the grace of God for the work they had now completed. On their arrival they assembled the church and gave an account of all that God had done with them, and how he had opened the door of faith to the pagans.

<u>A reading from the book of the Apocalypse</u> 21:1-5

I, John, saw a new heaven and a new earth; the first heaven and the first earth had disappeared now, and there was no longer any sea. I saw the holy city, and the new Jerusalem, coming down from God out of heaven, as beautiful as a bride all dressed for her husband. Then I heard a loud voice call from the throne, 'You see this city? Here God lives among men. He will make his home among them; they shall be his people, and he will be their God; his name is God-with-them. He will wipe away all tears from their eyes; there will be no more death, and no more mourning or sadness. The world of the past has gone.' Then the One sitting on the throne spoke: 'Now I am making the whole of creation new'.

<u>A reading from the holy Gospel according to John</u> 13:31-35

When Judas had gone Jesus said: 'Now has the Son of Man been glorified, and in him God has been glorified. If God has been glorified in him, God will in turn glorify him in himself, and will glorify him very soon. My little children, I shall not be with you much longer. I give you a new commandment: love one another; just as I have loved you, you also must love one another. By this love you have for one another, everyone will know that you are my disciples'.

Scripture Notes

Jesus' commandment to love one another, is only new in that it sets a new standard; to love one another as Jesus has loved them, and by doing this all will know that they are his disciples. St John says that God is love, and that we are made in his image, which is the most important thing that the bible has to say. This means that each of us has an innate capacity to love. The image of God is at its best and brightest in us when we love – we become like God. Loving makes us joyful, and is a call to life. Love both demands and brings out the best in us. Being loved by others, as well as loving others, gives one surprising courage and energy. Jesus spoke about love at the Last Supper,' Greater love no one has than the one who lays down their life for their friends. However, it is probably only later, that the apostles appreciated the extent of his love for them. Then they finally understood the greatness of the challenge facing them when he said, 'Love one another as I have loved you.'
