PROJECT COMPASSION - HAVING MORE OR BEING MORE?

St Mary's students were busy during Lent raising money for Project Compassion. The challenge was to see which class or level could make the most shelters out of icy-pole sticks. For every \$1 donated, the class purchased 2 icy pole sticks, which were then glued to a box to make a shelter. Students were asked to do jobs at home to earn

their donation. Year 5 students raised the most money and made 13 shelters altogether. The school made 47 shelters in total, and a 'Jeans for Jesus' casual clothes day also helped bring the amount raised to over \$1500. At St Mary's School, we are trying not to have more, but to be more.

Sobriety Practise

"Have you ever imagined St Joseph as a migrant worker?


Would he have taken with him as many tools of trade as he could carry when he fled with Mary and the child Jesus into Egypt?

POPE CALLS FOR GLOBAL PRAYER MARATHON

"The initiative will involve in a special way all shrines in the world" in promoting the initiative so that individuals, families and communities all take part in reciting the



"It is the heartfelt desire of the Holy Father that the month of May be dedicated to a prayer marathon dedicated to the theme, 'from the entire Church an unceasing prayer rises to God,'" it said.

The theme refers to the miraculous event recounted in the Acts of the Apostles (12:1-12) when all the Church prayed for Peter, who was imprisoned until God sent an angel to free him, illustrating how the Christian community comes together to pray in the face of danger and how the Lord listens and performs an unexpected miracle.

The Pope will open the month long prayer May 1 and conclude it on May 31, the council said.

Each day in May, there will be a livestream from one of 30 chosen Marian shrines or sanctuaries to guide the prayer at 6pm Rome time (2am AEST) on all Vatican media platforms.

At his general audience yesterday, Pope Francis said prayer "is dialogue with God; and every creature, in a certain sense, engages in dialogue with God", Vatican News reports.

For human beings, he continued, "prayer becomes word, invocation, hymn, poetry ... The divine Word is made flesh, and in the flesh of every person the word returns to God in prayer".

Entrance Antiphon

Proclaim a joyful sound and let it be heard; proclaim to the ends of the earth: The Lord has freed his people, alleluia.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (10:25-26, 34-35, 44-48)

The gift of the Holy Spirit was poured out upon the gentiles also

As Peter reached the house Cornelius went out to meet him, knelt at his feet and prostrated himself. But Peter helped him up. 'Stand up', he said 'I am only a man after all!' Then Peter addressed them: 'The truth I have now come to realise' he said 'is that God does not have favourites, but that anybody of any nationality who fears God and does what is right is acceptable to him.' While Peter was still speaking the Holy Spirit came down on all the listeners. Jewish believers who had accompanied Peter were all astonished that the gift of the Holy Spirit should be poured out on the pagans too, since they could hear them speaking strange languages and proclaiming the greatness of God. Peter himself then said, 'Could anyone refuse the water of baptism to these people, now they have received the Holy Spirit just as much as we have?' He then gave orders for them to be baptised in the name of Jesus Christ. Afterwards they begged him to stay on for some days.

A reading from the first letter of St John (4: 11-16)

If we love one another God will live in us.

My dear people, since God has loved us so much, we too should love one another. No one has ever seen God; but as long as we love one another God will live in us and his love will be complete in us. We can know that we are living in him and he is living in us because he lets us share his Spirit. We ourselves saw and we testify that the Father sent his Son as saviour of the world. If anyone acknowledges that Jesus is the Son of God, God lives in him, and he in God. We ourselves have known and put our faith in God's love towards ourselves. God is love and anyone who lives in love lives in God, and God lives in him.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia!

All who love me will keep my words, and my Father will love them and we will come to them. Alleluia!

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (15: 9-17)

No one can have greater love than to lay down his life for his friends.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love. I have told you this so that my own joy may be in you and your joy be complete. This is my commandment: love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends. You are my friends, if you do what I command you. I shall not call you servants any more, because a servant does not know his master's business; I call you friends, because I have made known to you everything I have learnt from my Father. You did not choose me, no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last; and then the Father will give you anything you ask in my name. What I command you is to love one another.'

Scripture Notes

A striking feature of the first reading is that the Holy Spirit descends on Cornelius (a Roman centurion and Gentile), before baptism, usually the Spirit descends after baptism. In the second reading John says that loving is the only way we can really know God and share in His life. In the Gospel Jesus talks about the love that binds Him to the father and the love that should bind the disciples to him and one another. We cannot give love unless we have first received it. A radiator cannot give out heat unless it has first received heat. It is not a sign of weakness to admit our need for love, and as far as God's love is concerned, we don't have to earn it. God loves us, not because we are good, but because He is good. All we have to do is to receive it and then try to share it with others. Love can be costly – and in loving we accept that we need to step back from self and selfishness. Dostoyevsky said," The best way to know God is to love many things – a friend, a partner or something and you will be on the right way to knowing God."

Love is the best teacher we have, but it does not come of its own accord, often demanding many years of persevering toil before we reach the point where we are able to love. We are made in God's image and each of us has an innate capacity for love, but to realise this the heart has to be right. We have a heart of flesh not stone, and may need to heal the wounds of the heart in order to be able to produce the fruits of love. Jesus talks about love and joy in the same breath as they are intimately connected. Joy is the fruit of love and an overflowing heart. The amount of joy we have is in proportion to the amount of love we share with others. If we are not as joyful as we might be, perhaps it is telling us something.
