that we may live the joy of the Gospel. Through Jesus Christ our Lord, bread for the journey from age to age. Amen.




#### **MORNING TEA - 6TH MARCH**

# Liturgy of the Word – Homily

After we have listened to the biblical readings, we have the homily. It's meant to be a proclamation of the Good News, because, if God speaks to us, it's always Good News. That doesn't mean to say it's easy news but it's Good News. The homilist has listened to the Word of God with the people and now helps the people to take that word and apply it to their everyday life as individuals and as a community.

It's God's word that we're hungering for. The proclamation of the biblical readings means that the homily has to be not a word of the priest but the Word of God. It is essentially a liturgical moment, the homily. Not personal to the priest but the Word of God spoken to God's people and if they hear the Word of God, there will be that sense that I have heard the Good News that can sustain me in my life and even empower me for mission.

# **Entrance Antiphon**

# **A Reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke** (6:39-45)

Jesus told a parable to his disciples, 'Can one blind man guide another? Surely both will fall into a pit? The disciple is not superior to his teacher; the fully trained disciple will always be like his teacher. Why do you observe the splinter in your brother's eye and never notice the plank in your own? How can you say to your brother, "Brother, let me take out the splinter that is in your eye," when you cannot see the plank in your own? Hypocrite! Take the plank out of your own eye first, and then you will see clearly enough to take out the splinter that is in your brother's eye.

'There is no sound tree that produces rotten fruit, nor again a rotten tree that produces sound fruit. For every tree can be told by its own fruit: people do not pick figs from thorns, nor gather grapes from brambles. A good man draws what is good from the store of goodness in his heart; a bad man draws what is bad from the store of badness. For a man's words flow out of what fills his heart.'

#### Scripture Notes

'They shall bear fruit even in old age; vigorous and sturdy shall they be...' Psalm 92:15

One of my ministerial joys comes from meeting monthly with a small group of community members who are in their early 90's. We have enriching conversations about the later years of life and how this stage affects their spiritual growth. They remind me that no amount of physical diminishments or limitations can mar a person's ability to seek an ever closer relationship with God. Psalm 92 proclaims that the lives of elders can continue to be fruitful in new ways. I hear this in their descriptions of increasing gratitude for the things overlooked in the past - such as being able to take a shower, relishing quiet time for deeper contemplation and increasing awareness of the endless opportunities to extend a kindness to someone nearby. These older women have become more convinced about the most essential part of life's journey: a vigorous union with the One who has claimed their hearts.
