

The Feast of Pentecost 23rd May 2021, Year B

Entrance Antiphon

The love of God has been poured into our hearts through the Spirit of God dwelling within us, alleluia.

A reading from the Acts of the Apostles (2:1-11)

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech. Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome - Jews and proselytes alike - Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

Responsorial Psalm

<u>A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Galatians</u> (5:16-25)

If you are guided by the Spirit you will be in no danger of yielding to self-indulgence, since self-indulgence is the opposite of the Spirit, the Spirit is totally against such a thing, and it is precisely because the two are so opposed that you do not always carry out your good intentions. If you are led by the Spirit, no law can touch you. When self-indulgence is at work the results are obvious: fornication, gross indecency and sexual irresponsibility; idolatry and sorcery; feuds and wrangling, jealousy, bad temper and quarrels; disagreements, factions, envy; drunkenness, orgies and similar things. I warn you now, as I warned you before: those who behave like this will not inherit the kingdom of God. What the Spirit brings is very different: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, trustfulness, gentleness and self-control. There can be no law against things like that, of course. You cannot belong to Christ Jesus unless you crucify all self-indulgent passions and desire. Since the Spirit is our life, let us be directed by the Spirit.

Gospel Acclamation

Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. **Alleluia!**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John (15:26-27; 16:12-15)

Jesus said to his disciples: 'When the Advocate comes, whom I shall send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who issues from the Father, he will be my witness. And you too will be witnesses, because you have been with me from the outset. 'I still have many things to say to you but they would be too much for you now. But when the Spirit of truth comes he will lead you to the complete truth, since he will not be speaking as from himself but will say only what he has learnt; and he will tell you of the things to come. He will glorify me, since all he tells you will be taken from what is mine. Everything the Father has is mine; that is why I said: All he tells you will be taken from what is mine.'

Scripture Notes

St Paul talks about the 'fruits of the Spirit' (Gal 5;22). He says that if we allow ourselves to be guided by the Holy Spirit, our lives will be characterised by such things as love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.

Pauls puts *Love* first as in the words of Jesus," Everyone will know you are my disciples by the love you have for one another." For Christians, love is meant to be the be the identifying characteristic of their religion.

Joy, is an overflowing heart. The amount of joy we have is in proportion to the amount of love we share with others. **Peace**, was Jesus' farewell gift to his apostles. It is internal. Peace results when we trust in God, and when the desire to please Him is the dominant thing in our life. This is something we can have in the midst of turmoil, conflict, unresolved problems and a pandemic.

Patience, involves the ability to wait, to trust and to endure. These are now almost the polar opposite to life today. But waiting is part of life and many things are ruined by rushing.

Kindness, The kindness of Jesus shines in the pages of the Gospel. It calls for awareness, sensitivity, and self-forgetfulness.

Faithfulness, is one of the greatest and most necessary things in life, though it is costly. It demands unselfishness and a spirit of sacrifice, but even here on earth it can bring great rewards of growth, serenity and joy. As Jesus' disciples we are tasked to be faithful, not successful.

Gentleness, 'Blessed are the gentle, they will inherit the earth.' (Mt5;4). It is often seen as a form of weakness. If you love you are gentle and there are certain tasks that can only gentleness can accomplish.

Self-control, is probably the hardest. It means being in control of oneself. Paul warns us against self-indulgence which can produce cruelty, meanness, revenge and overindulging behaviours. These are ugly things which make life miserable. The more we renounce ourselves and walk in the Spirit, the more fruitful our lives will become.
